v. Coordination with Other Ministries and Actors

What to include:

- Cooperation with other ministries
- Role of regional governments, NGOs, international partners
- Inter-ministerial or public-private coordination

vi. International and Regional Engagement

What to include:

- Participation in UN, regional, or bilateral initiatives
- Agreements, alliances, or negotiations led by your ministry
- Actions supported or opposed internationally

vii. Ministerial Priorities and Strategic Objectives

What to include:

- Short-term and long-term goals
- Clear priorities specific to your ministry
- How success will be measured

viii. Proposed Actions and Policy Recommendations

What to include:

- Concrete, realistic proposals your ministry would implement
- Reforms, funding plans, enforcement mechanisms
- Alignment with national ideology and government policy
- IMPORTANT: Do NOT propose actions outside your ministry's authority.

ix. Conclusion

What to include:

- Summary of your ministry's commitment
- Reaffirmation of cooperation and responsibility
- Strong closing statement.

vii. References

What to include:

- APA 7th edition format

- Government documents
- UN or regional organizations sources
- References should be in a different page than the ministerial agenda

Notes:

- There should be a Ministerial Agenda per topic.
- Each delegate should hand in one copy of each ministerial agenda to the chair and have one printed copy for them. (It would not be allowed to have the position paper in electronic devices).
- Format: Times New Roman 12, justified, line spacing 2

Topic A: Protection of Civilians in Armed Conflict

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the United Mexican States is responsible for conducting the country's foreign policy, representing national interests abroad, and promoting international cooperation in accordance with constitutional principles. In relation to the protection of civilians in armed conflict, the Ministry plays a central role in diplomatic engagement, multilateral negotiations, and cooperation with international organizations, including the United Nations.
